
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'TIS THE SEASON

The retraction would be published in the next issue of the Bulletin at the expense of the individual(s) whose ad has been challenged. The Secretary will notify the person(s) who made the original challenge, Board members and the Bulletin Editor when the reply has been received. If the reply is not received by the Secretary within the 30 day limit, no future Bulletin advertising will be accepted from the person(s) whose ad has been questioned until a reply is received.







A LONG WAY FOR LOVE

This is the kind of story from which movies are made. Unfortunately, the Walt Disney cameras were not present and rolling.

It's the story about a Bullmastiff bitch left by an owner to stray, and about how that bitch found love and returned love.

For practical purposes here, the story begins in January or February of 1981 when a group of women were talking in a Hermitage, Missouri beauty shop about a very large dog that had been roaming the Lake Pommede Terre area.

Mary Brock overheard the story and relayed it to her daughter, Sandy Startzman of Weaubleau. Sandy, being a dog lover, went in search of the mystery dog, and with the aid of the people in the area she found the bitch.

Her problem was that she wasn't certain just exactly what it was she had found. With bits and pieces of information provided by area residents, she was able to determine that some man who had lived in Urbana, Mo. had owned the dog. He worked for an area trucking firm, and when he was relocated elsewhere, he left the dog behind, which may have been for the best, because according to some people he had mistreated her badly.

Left on her own, the bitch roamed the area looking for handouts. She lived off scraps provided by area residents and she struck up a romance with at least one other area dog. That romance produced a litter of pups.

In apparent return for their kindness to her, the new mother weaned her pups and then deposited one on each of the doorsteps of the people who had helped her. One family received two pups.

Sandy took that very thin dog home with her, not knowing her breed or much else about her. She soon set out to find out just exactly what it was she had befriended.

After being told by one veterinarian that the bitch was a mixed breed of some sort, Sandy finally found someone who provided her with the name of Mr. and Mrs. James Crotwell of Morrisville, Mo., saying they had some dogs that looked quite a lot like her new friend. She had named her "Babe" after Paul Bunyan's ox.

Her first visit to the Crotwell's kennel was without Babe, but after seeing the Crotwell dogs she didn't need Babe there to be able to convince herself that what she had found was a Bullmastiff.

On her second visit, she brought Babe with her. She is a very gentle, lovable fawn-colored bitch with a good head, dark mask and ears. She was about 50 pounds heavier by then than she was when Sandy provided her a home.

That's not the end of the story, though.

Another feature about Babe's physical status is that she has a small scar and callous on her back, and when touched on that spot she reacts with pain.

That indicated to the Crotwell family that there might indeed be more to the story. One of their dogs had come from a litter of pups which was nearly stolen at one time. They remembered that one particular pup in the litter had been injured during that attempted theft and surgery had been required.

No definite proof had been found, but Mrs. Crotwell did a bit of research and determined that there is at least some cause to believe that Babe and one of their bitches are litter mates. She remembered the name of the man who had purchased the injured pup and gave him a call.

He confirmed that he had grown tired of the bitch and had sold it to some man in the lakes area, but he couldn't remember his name.

So, if suspicions prove to be true, Babe's troubles have not been just recent troubles. She has faced them all her life. But she now seems little less for wear.

She is good natured, lovable, and particularly good with Sandy's kids. She is companion to a set of six-year-old twins and together they guard over Sandy's 10-month-old daughter.

She has found love and she is returning love.

As a post script, Babe is responding quite well to treatment for malnutrition and wounds received during her ordeal. This story once again emphasizes the importance of follow up inquiries on puppy sales and support of the rescue committee.





YOU, YOUR DOG, YOUR NEIGHBORS, AND THE LAW

Now and then, people who own dogs encounter unpleasant incidents in their neighborhoods due to the inevitable conflicts between people who keep and raise dogs as a hobby and those who might, understandably, be annoyed by barking, odors or pets running at large. Also a certain number of problems arise when the Electric Meter or Water Meter readers visit a property owned by a protective dog. Often when such incidents occur the dogs are actually harmed in some way and the owner feels that he must take some action to protest such cruelty and thoughtlessness. Three particular cases come to mind and prompt these reminders about the handling of an unpleasant incident.

First, two of our club members found themselves involved with their neighbors because of complaints about the number of dogs they were keeping and the noise. The neighbors turned to local officials who called the owners into court for violations in the State Dog Law. Fortunately they consulted a lawyer who was knowledgeable and sympathetic about dog ownership and who advised them that as long as their dogs were individually licensed they were not in violation of the state laws concerning kennels. When dogs are individually licensed they are required to wear their licenses at all times, even if they are kept in outside kennels all the time. With good legal help and a thorough knowledge of the dog law these owners were able to overcome the charges against them. Now they keep peace with their neighbors by making a real effort to keep noise to a minimum.

Second was the case of an attack by a meter reader on a dog behind a fence. When the meter reader approached the yard, the dog began to bark and lunge. He sprayed the dog with mace, which injured its eyes and affected its personality. The owner kept her wits and immediately found out the man's name and identification number. She began to keep a diary of the incident, the veterinarian's treatment and advice, and her conversations with the meter reader's employer. She discovered that meter readers are expressly prohibited from carrying any device to ward off animals except a high frequency noise maker. Mace is strictly against company rules. Because of the dog owner's careful attention and immediate action she was able to recover substantially all the costs incurred as a result of the macing.

The third case did not end happily at all. The dog's owner suspected that she was being harassed by neighbor's teenagers when she began to find things tossed into the dog run. At first they were small objects that would not cause much harm. Then she began to find walnuts and larger items which might choke a dog. Finally she discovered a whole pumpkin had been tossed over the fence and she lost her cool and hauled it back to the neighbor's lawn and left it there. Shortly thereafter, she went out to the market, needing a few items for the bitch which was due to whelp the next day. When she returned, she discovered that someone had opened the kennel and released four of her dogs, allowing them to run loose in a high traffic area. The bitch in whelp was killed by a passing truck and even a heroic effort at a caesarian section could not save the pups. Two dogs were recovered and returned by neighbors and the fourth was found dead by the road the next morning. Upon contacting the police the owner found that there was not enough evidence to accuse the suspect, in spite of her assertions of ongoing harrassment. In frustration she did not pursue the case but continued to find the teenager hanging around the property.

Clear cut cases of harassment such as this are very difficult to deal with, but a careful diary of each individual incident, kept on a daily basis, both before and after the death of the dogs might have produced enough evidence for a case. The police do not respond to complaints from dog owners because "they are just dogs". We must remind them that dogs are personal property and entitled to as much protection under the law as our furniture, jewelry and car. Because of the possible tragic consequences of simple childish harassment, it is important to deal with it on a mature level as soon as the pattern is established. Keep careful records and contact the police with any concrete evidence.

The State Dog Law governed the outcome only of the first of these cases. The macing incident might eventually be presented to one of the Humane Societies for prosecution as cruelty to animals. The last was a case for local police. We often think that if the incident involves dogs it should be prosecuted by the Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement but since this is not always the case we should remember that there are other agencies and authorities to which we can turn for assistance when we feel that our dogs, or our right to keep them is being attacked.

A well-muscled dog with good slope to his shoulders. Good mouth with even teeth. Moved well.

3. TAURALAN TITIAN ROCKETTE (Tim Hammond & Debra Hammond)

A large happy bitch with very pleasing temperament. She lacked good pigmentation. Her "mastiff" type head lacked the pronounced stop and good wrinkle that I would like to see. Did not move as nicely in front as the other two bitches.



All replies are as follows:

- 1. "There's a wide span allowed for OFA. Not all OFA dogs can produce good hips in their offspring. I believe a deeper and tight hip socket is important on both parents to produce good hips in their offspring."
- 2. "I don't know the OFA breeding stock. But I suppose that it is similar to our system. In West Germany we have 5 Classes of hip dysplasia: a, if the dog has no h.d. it is class 0; b, if the dog could have it or not (we call it transition stage) it is class 1; c, if the dog has little h.d. it is class 2; d, if the dog has middle h.d. it is class 3 (in this class you are allowed to breed only with dogs of class 0 or 1); e, if the dog has heavy h.d. it is class 4 (in this case you can't breed at all). In West Germany, it is obligatory to x-ray the dogs at the age of 12 months if you have the intention to breed them. If your dog is not x-rayed, you cannot breed."
- 3. "The vet said that the bitch would not pass the OFA certification because of a calcium deposit in one hip. She used to win on her superior rear movement and she still

moves well today. She was bred twice to OFA males. Not one pup of the 18 puppies developed a limp. Two dogs were x-rayed, one passed the OFA and the other had a minor problem in one hip."

- 4. "All breeding stock are x-rayed and they try to breed dogs with normal hips if at all possible. If the dog has something to offer and is marginal in the hips, they breed. There is more to Bullmastiffs than hips."
- 5. "The original stud and brood bitch came from OFA parents. We practice a very prudent observance of any signs relating to hip dysplasia."
- 6. "One does not need a certificate. A good vet can see. I do not necessarily believe that only certified dogs should be bred."
- 7. "All stock is x-rayed at 1 year as a preliminary for OFA. The same stock is re-evaluated at 2 years and only the dogs that are given an OFA number are bred. Nothing is bred that had entropions or serious structural defects."
- 8. "I had 2 pups from the same sire and bitch in 2 separate litters. The sire was OFA. I stopped using that sire and started stressing the need to new owners to not overfeed their pup and that calcium supplementation was not necessary."





SOCIABLE BULLMASTIFFS

Having been a Bullmastiff owner and breeder for several years I have had the opportunity to visit with many other Bullmastiff owners and breeders over the years. On occasions I have found that other Bullmastiff owners, and especially some of the breeders, are amazed when they find out that I often allow Bullmastiffs of the same sex to mingle freely with each other instead of being rigidly separated.

I cannot understand why so many people are amazed at this. However, due to the number of inquiries as to how I can do this, I agreed to do a short article for the Bullmastiff Bulletin explaining how I do it.

Basically, I have found the Bullmastiff as a breed to be one that is totally dedicated to their owner and/or family. It is this tremendous dedication that will allow the owner to bring out the best or worst in their Bullmastiff.

My personal experiences with my Bullmastiffs have convinced me that the Bullmastiff's main goal in life is to please their master or family, and in some instances they will go against some of their basic instincts if they feel this is what their master really wants. I'm sure there are many individual specimens of Bullmastiffs that this may not necessarily apply to, just as there are individual differences in human beings, even among close family members. However, in many instances, I have found this to be the case.

By personally keeping a close relationship with my Bullmastiffs and instilling into them, beginning when they are puppies, that it is my desire for them to get along and be sociable with the other dogs when on neutral territory, I have been able to keep them together.

To let the young Bullmastiff know that you don't want him to fight with other dogs, you should keep a close eye on him. The first time he snaps at or threatens to attack another dog you should sharply scold him to make sure he really understands you don't want him fighting. I have found the tone of the voice much more effective than trying to physically punish the Bullmastiff for any type of corrective action. I also like to introduce my young Bullmastiffs to other playful and friendly adult dogs so as to have them understand that this is the type of attitude I expect a dog to have. The one thing you should avoid at all costs is to take the young Bullmastiff into a situation where he may be attacked by another dog.

Another way to lessen the chances of the young Bullmastiff becoming involved in a fight is to get into the habit of separating the dogs at feeding time. Most young Bullmastiffs have healthy appetites, especially during their younger

growing stages, and will not hesitate in fighting when another tries to push them out of their food pan.

New owners must be made aware that the Bullmastiff is not a breed you can encourage to play bully and have a few puppy fights then change when they grow older and stronger. Suddenly such an activity is no longer cute, but is a serious matter. I cannot stress enough the importance of preventing young dogs from becoming involved in that very first fight.

By studying your individual Bullmastiff's facial expression, and especially their eyes, you should soon learn to predict what's on his mind and take the proper corrective action before an altercation takes place. Each Bullmastiff telegraphs his intentions in some distinct manner—all you have to do is learn to interpret them. Using this method with my young Bullmastiffs has allowed my family and me to use our dogs successfully as constant companions, be it out hunting, at work, or whatever the occasion may be, without worrying about them making a nuisance of themselves. It has basically allowed us to use our Bullmastiffs as just good all around family dogs.

A side effect has been that our dogs have been praised by many Judges at the dog shows for their muscle tone and physical conditioning as compared to many other specimens. The fact that our dogs are stable enough to use in virtually any situation has allowed our dogs to get much more exercise to keep their muscle tone, as compared to those that could be considered problem dogs that must be rigidly kennelled with little chance for practical, meaningful outdoor recreation. In fact, while showing my late Champion Big Bubba at about eight years of age in the veteran dog class, the judge called me aside and asked his age. When I told him, he could hardly believe it, and commented that he was the proudest and best moving Bullmastiff he had ever seen, regardless of age. I attribute a great deal of this to his conditioning, as Bubba was so versatile I could use him for almost anything, and usually did. Until a day before his death, due to a ruptured stomach, at ten years of age, he moved better than many of the young dogs one sees at the shows.

In today's society there are many people looking for family dogs to provide home protection against burglars, vandals, etc. By training your Bullmastiff in the manner I use, I feel you will not have to worry about some stranger opening the door to your home or the gate of your yard only to have your Bullmastiff rush out past him and chase some stray dog down the street.

In my opinion a well behaved, stable Bullmastiff is the best, most devoted, understanding and faithful companion a person could ever hope to have, as his entire being is devoted to being and doing what ever he feels will please his master. If this includes being sociable with other dogs in the household, he will do it for you, not because he necessarily likes the other dogs. At least they do it for me—maybe others would like to give it a try.







OBEDIENCE

Two people sent letters to the obedience column. One concerned a Bullmastiff who allegedly attacked another dog before going into the obedience ring, and then was allowed to compete in Novice. Since I do not know the details, I do not feel that I can comment, other than to say that if the judge felt the dog would be a danger to the other dogs in the ring it would have been excused. Aggressiveness in adult Bullmastiffs can best be dealt with by a professional trainer. The best cure is prevention. Socialize your puppies and punish any signs of aggression when it first begins.

In this issue we were to deal with lagging, not paying attention, and running away. Mona Lindau-Webb wrote saying that she overcame lagging by always practicing the exercises at a run. This is a great idea, and for those of us not in such good shape, we should always walk at a fast pace with a spring in our steps. It really helps speed up a lagging dog. If your dog lags on the outside turn of the figure eight, give the collar correction, before you get to the turn (even if your dog is not lagging at that point). Then in a happy tone of voice talk to him all the way around the post. Talk to him on every outside turn until he gets the idea he must speed up to stay with you. Slowness on the recall is really the same problem as lagging. The easiest way to speed up the dog is to use food. When you first start the off-lead recall have a treat for your dog when he comes in. Do not give it to him until he is sitting straight in front of you. Never give it to him when he has returned to the heel position, because this will make him go directly to heel instead of stopping in front of you. After the dog learns to come in quickly use food only occasionally. I don't recommend using food in training classes; just use it in practice.

To keep a dog's attention Mona recommends talking to the dog. I cannot stress enough that this is the most important thing you can do in training your dog. When you are teaching your dog to heel, keep up a constant stream of chatter. After your dog knows how to heel give him a slight collar correction whenever he is looking around and say something like "Pay attention" or "Watch me." If he does not keep right at your side, give a hard collar correction and then praise him when he gets into the right position. Give him a lot of praise when he is doing something right. Take him to strange places to practice, and give corrections whenever he isn't watching you. Shopping centers are good places to train your dog for the show ring. Don't let strangers pat or talk to your dog while you are training. Just tell them he is working and to wait until you have finished.

Running off is the hardest thing to correct. Most Bullmastiffs (particularly the males) love to run and won't come back until they are ready. When your dog is still a puppy put him on a forty foot lead (nylon clothes line is ideal) and let him run around at the end of the line. Then in a firm voice give the command to come. If he does not come on the *first* command, jerk him in to you and praise him when he gets there. Keep repeating this until he comes on the first command without a jerk. When the dog gets older and he is not on lead he will probably try to get away for a run. If this becomes a problem there is a method which usually works. It takes two people, because you should not punish your dog when he finally comes to you. The next time he will not come at all. Take your dog to a large fenced area and let him run and play. Then call him to you. If he does not come on the first command, have the other person catch him for you. Put the lead on him, say "come", and jerk him into you. Let him go to the end of the lead and call him. If he comes without jerking give him plenty of praise. When he is again off lead and does not come on the first command, repeat the process with the other person catching him, but this time hit him with a leather lead. Then call him and praise him. This may have to be repeated several times, each time with a harder beating. Eventually, if the punishment is severe enough and the praise lavish enough, he will realize it is better to obey than not to. Cruel and inhumane punishment? Not if you realize you may be saving his life. There is always the chance that he could be hit by a car.

Next issue we will talk about beginning training for the CDX and some of the things you can do during novice training to make things easier. Keep the letters coming.

WHEN YOUR BULLMASTIFF BECOMES A SENIOR CITIZEN

When counting in human years our pets are young, but when adding up their age in animal years they become senior citizens quite rapidly. Generally, dogs live from 12 to 14 years (smaller breeds live the longest). Our Bullmastiffs reach senior status sooner, as they have a shorter life span—somewhere between 5 and 8 years.

Realizing these unavoidable facts and coming to terms with them early on can give the Bullmastiff owner and breeder time to prepare for their dog's special needs as they grow older.

Signs of advancing age are:

- *Slowed activity
- *Weight gain (or in some cases weight loss)
- *Stiffened movements
- *Change in personality
- *Impaired hearing and/or vision
- *Bad breath
- *Loss of bladder and bowel control

You can make old age more pleasant for your Bullmastiff and still have fun with him or her. Along with your own good judgement and loving concern, a good, reliable veterinarian is your most important asset. A preventive care policy in conjunction with your vet is a must. Regular detailed exams at least twice a year can be a valuable deterrent against oncoming ailments. You should be aware of diet in particular, for as your Bullmastiff grows older there is a change in digestion and chewing ability. Arthritis is one of the main problems in aging dogs, and there is pain involved. In most cases this can be relieved by simple medication prescribed by your vet. Loss of hearing and failing vision are also common symptoms of old age, but unfortunately (except for cataracts) there is little that can be done.

Helpful hints for making your older Bullmastiff safe and happier:

- *Walks should be short and slower
- *Avoid extremes in temperature
- *Dry, soft, draft-free place to sleep
- *More frequent letting out for bowel and bladder relief
- *Less activity with younger dogs
- *No long car trips
- *Strict diet control
- *Lots of love and attention

You the owner will have to decide when your Bullmastiff is no longer living a happy life, but one of pain. This is a difficult and painful time for anyone who has loved and lived with an animal. The kindest and most humane gift you can give your Bullmastiff is the peace he or she deserves. The most painless way is through your veterinarian, who can administer the appropriate drug.


As sad and difficult as this time is for the Bullmastiff owner, time has a way of diminishing the hurt and replacing it with wonderful memories of your beloved friend.

BULLMASTIFFS FROM COAST TO COAST REPORT: THE CLIME IS JUST FINE

BULLMASTIFFS IN THE MID ATLANTIC STATES OF THE NORTHEAST By Helene Buzzeo

The winters here can be quite cold, with plenty of frosty days, enhanced by high humidity, giving man and dog a bone chilling treat. Summers can be brutal, temperatures are in the 90's, with high humidity, causing everyone to just lie around. It is not an even climate; changes occur rather rapidly. In the winter, one day it's freezing, the next day it's in the 50's; the same is true in the summer, it can be 95° with 99 percent humidity one day and the next day it's 65° with 20 percent humidity. The climate is fickle and that presents some problems for Bullmastiffs.

The biggest trouble in this region is the winter litter. If one doesn't have a properly heated facility, it is a most difficult undertaking. In the winter pups and dam have to be kept warm, at a constant temperature. Later, pups can only be put outside at the age of 7 to 8 weeks if they have a sheltered, sunny run, and if they have access to a warm, dry retreat. It really is best to have the shelter heated.

Adults, if they are housed outdoors in unheated kennels, should have a two-compartment dog house, which consists of a sleeping box and a "vestibule" to break the wind. For bedding we use straw, which is frequently changed if the weather is wet. It is most important for a Bullmastiff's well being to have a dry, draft free space in which to rest and sleep.

In the cold months, Bullmastiffs which live outdoors require additional food. This can be an increase in the ration or a fat supplement, such as lard or corn oil. Check with your veterinarian for proper quantities. If the dogs have access to a yard to romp around during the day, they will need extra food to keep in top condition while coping with the cold. We like a trifle of padding on the ribs of our dogs during the cold months to give them a bit of reserve to cope with extreme weather.

Those who have Bullmastiffs in a situation where the dogs are walked on streets or sidewalks should make sure that the dog's feet are washed after the walk to rinse off the salt, as this can irritate the feet and cause foot problems.

During the summer in this area, Bullmastiffs should not be exercised in the heat of the day. They should be let out before 10 a.m. and after 5 p.m. There should be plenty of water (clean) for them and the feeding schedule should be adjusted to the cool hours of the day. We fill a wading pool with water for them to romp in and to keep cool. They love it.

Insect control is important. We have a "zapper" to kill flies and mosquitos. Our dogs are dipped against fleas and ticks and are checked regularly for parasites. Dogs are kept on gravel which is disinfected with bleach solution regularly.

When going to a show, we take plenty of water and a tarp to shade the car. This applies from the spring shows right up into the fall.

The breed can do well in this area as it is so adaptable, but Bullmastiff owners must use their common sense. They must provide adequate, warm, draft free shelter in the winter and a cool, shaded spot in the summer for the dogs and puppies to thrive.

BULLMASTIFFS IN THE UPPER MIDWESTERN CLIMATE

Minnesota winters can be very severe. We often get below zero weather for a number of days at a time with a high wind chill factor. Under these conditions our Bullmastiffs have always grown a dense coat. However, we have never had one which we could consider an outside dog. When we first started in Bullmastiffs we had them in the house. As the number expanded we built a cement block kennel building, which was heated to 72°. I was never satisfied with the condition of their coats under these conditions. As the price of oil rose from 17¢ to over \$1.00 the temperature was lowered to 55°. Then I noticed an improvement in the coat condition.

Our dogs have always enjoyed playing in the snow, but when it is extremely cold they start lifting their feet after being out for even a short period of time. On days such as this they go out for a short time four or five times a day. On these extreme days I have tried to jog with them, but they seem to stiffen and on a number of occasions I have had to return in a very short time.

I know of a number of people who keep Bullmastiffs in well insulated dog houses with straw for bedding. Some have a lamp arrangement for the coldest days. Under these conditions they seem to adapt to the cold somewhat better than mine. One person in western Minnesota said that his dogs sit in the sun even on extremely cold days as long as they are sheltered from the wind.

During the winter our dogs have their food and fat intake increased. We are able to obtain gallon containers of hamburger fat, and find this works well for the coat and keeps a little more weight on them.

We have not experienced health problems in the winter. Summers are hot and humid. Under these conditions you can expect to have skin problems. For example, we have never had hot spots in the winter. This summer we had two dogs with what appeared to be bites of some kind. Skin scrapings produced no evidence of parasites. A vet from Montreal, Canada was visiting us one day and inspected the dogs. He said he did not know what it was, but suspected an allergic type reaction that would clear up when the weather turned cool. He was correct. I have since spoken to others who have had the same problem.

In sixteen or so years in Bullmastiffs I have had only one get so overheated that he was in trouble. Another problem that was almost at an epidemic stage a few years ago was heartworm. This has subsided in recent years due to preventive medication.

In general, I would rather cope with the rigorous winter conditions than the problems associated with our summers.

BULLMASTIFFS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

When I moved to Southern California from the high altitudes of New Mexico twenty years ago, I brought my first Bull-mastiff, Black Knight's Gabrielle, with me. The hardiness and short coat of the breed made adaptation to this temperature zone generally easy. However, the temperate climate which is so appealing to people also encourages the bountiful reproduction of flies, fleas, ticks, and air-borne bacteria.

The main problems concerning the Bullmastiff's adaptation to Southern California, I discovered, involved the maintenance of good coat and skin condition during the summer months. However, groomers and veterinarians with whom I have talked seem to reflect the opinion that the Bullmastiff's problems in this matter are minimal, especially when compared to other breeds.

In my opinion, the control of coat and skin problems begins with good nutrition. Oil is essential, and corn oil or cold pressed soy oil have been satisfactory additives, although wheat germ oil is preferable. I have heard of lard being suggested for this purpose, but I understand that any form of pork fat is undesirable in a dog's diet and should be avoided. Sea Meal, used for its wealth of trace elements, and a vitamin supplement after young animals have attained their size also contribute to healthy coat and skin. Pups under a year old rarely seem to have skin problems.

Except during the winter months, flies are an ever-present annoyance in a kennel. Biting flies can chew ears until they are permanently scarred. They also congregate around the hocks, but do less damage there. After trying fly traps, electric insect killers, and a variety of sprays and wipes, I find that Farnam's Wipe works as well for me as anything I know. For the dogs that live in the house, V.I.P. ointment on the ears seems to be sufficient.

Fleas are always a problem during the summer, and some have a serious time with their control. A neighbor of mine has her yard sprayed every month, washes or dips the dogs every week, and is barely able to keep hair on her Airedale during the summer. Directly across the road, I have relatively few problems. It is variable. I feed Petzymes during the summer, knowing this does not constitute a real flea control, but always hoping it will make the dogs as unattractive to a flea as possible. Then in addition I either shampoo or dip the animals as required. Since these are all toxic, I try to not use them more than necessary to control the situation. I'm still looking for a natural flea control that works!

When a hot spot develops, it is usually accompanied with an intense itching that requires a cortisone shot for relief. Much grief seems to be saved by going to the vet immediately rather than trying to remedy the situation at home.

Needless to say, housing in this climate requires a shady area, and I understand that especially in the desert regular inspection for ticks is necessary.

In summer, Bullmastiffs adapt readily to this part of the country, but good care in feeding and housing, and a steady vigilance for skin disorders, especially during summer months, are essential.


