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THE PRIVATE IMAGE OF THE BULLMASTIFF

A training program is divided into two phases 1) deciding upon objectives, and 2) utilizing knowledge,e time and patience to achieve them. The most important factor in your training program will be the working relationship you establish with your dog.

A sound, patient training program directed step-by-step toward clearly defined objective which have been based upon a realistic appraisal of what the canine mind can absorb and retain, will almost certainly be successful. Conversely, inconsistent, impatient, hit-or-miss training based upon poorly defined objectives will result in confusion for the dog, and dissatisfaction, discouragement, and failure for the trainer.

Whether you already own a dog, or whether you intend to buy one, no matter what its age or development, you must begin with phase one - deciding upon objectives. Why do you have a dog? More specifically, why do you have a Bullmastiff? What do you think the dog's purpose and place in your household should be? Is he to be a companion, guard, playmate~ Is he to be a "house dog" or a "kennel dog"? Is he to be the only dog, or part of a breeding kennel?

Decide upon specific objectives based upon personal family preferences. What rooms will the dog be allow to enter? Will he be allowed on furniture and beds? Will he be permitted in the dining area during dinner? Will he be fed inside or outside the house? Where do you wish him to sleep?

Clearly define behavior patterns which you hope to instill, e.g., a calm, watchful attitude when strangers enter the house, confident friendliness towards friends, immediate response to commands to sit, down stay, heel, back wait, etc. Think of as many situations as you can that involve your dog and you. How do you want him to react in those situations? Which standard training commands and techniques be adapted for use in those situations?

The best way to avoid poor behavior patterns is to prevent them by instilling good behavior patters before the bad habits form. If the bad habits are already there, you can minimize them with proper training, but it will take more time, more patience and complete consistency.

When you have outlined realistic objectives, sit down and study your dog. You must understand him before you can train him. What are his physical attributes - size, strength, endurance? What are his physical limitations? The Bullmastiff is not built for the high-jumping, quick-twisting, agile gymnastics of the shepherding breeds. He is not a "natural" retriever like the Chesapeake; although some individuals will be more inclined that others to fetch and carry. He is not a "bred-in" trailer like some of the hound breeds which have been selected for generations for their ability to run a rabbit. However, he can be trained to jump, to retrieve and to track, because he likes to work. The Bullmastiff is a working dog, and as such, should be bred specifically for his responsiveness to command.

Study the temperament of your dog. The training techniques your will use, the amount and kind of praise, the firmness of correction, the response he give to you, will depend upon his basic temperament. Is he calm, unexcitable, passive?

Is he excitable, high-strung, unpredictable? Is he consistent or inconsistent in his response to your attempts to discipline him? What keys him up, or "turns him off"? Study your dog until you can predict his behavior accurately in a given situation.

While you study your dog in those situations, study yourself. What is your basic attitude toward your dog? Aloof or affectionate? Reserved or exuberant? Patient or impatient? Firm or permissive? What are <u>your</u> physical and emotional strengths and limitations?

When you have laid a foundation of perspective and understanding, you are ready to build a <u>working relationship</u>. Training can be classified in two ways: intentional and unintentional. Intentional training is practiced at formal obedience classes and at home; i.e., putting on a leash, practicing specific commands and responses. Unintentional training includes all those things you have taught your dog without realizing it, e.g., to recognize your moods, to interpret unconscious gestures and changes in voice tone, to respond positively or negatively. he probably know these moods and gestures better than you do yourself. His security depends upon it.

Intentional training in most cases averages ten or fifteen minutes a day on leash, and an hour a week in a formal training class. Unintentional training goes on 24 hours a day. The unintentional training, the attitude you demonstrate toward your dog <u>all</u> the time, not just when on lead practicing set routines, will make or break the intentional training you give him.

What did you do the last time your dog nosed at the garbage can? Did you shout, "Come here! How-many-times-have-I-told-you-to-stay--out-of-that!" and swat him when he cam near enough? What did he learn: Did he learn to stay out of the garbage, or did he learn to stay out of reach when you should, "Come!" It will take a lot of time on lead, training intentionally, to erase the negative effect of the unintentional training...the angry swat when you shouted, "Come!"

Successful training will depend upon your ability to train yourself to be calm, firm, consistent, and persistent, <u>all</u> of the time with your dog. <u>Every</u> time you tell your dog to sit, no matter what else distracts you or him, you must see to it that he sits...calmly and firmly and <u>always</u> with praise, no matter how much of a struggle it was. Every time you call him, you must be in a position to enforce it, calmly, <u>pleasantly</u>, and with much praise. You must <u>never</u> command him to come and then punish him, and so on. Consistency is a key to success.

The working relationship with your dog, 24 hours a day, should be based upon a mutual respect, understanding and perspective. A dog is a dog: he thinks, acts and learns like a dog. He learns through cause and effect, contrasted pleasure and displeasure and constant repetition. What is your leverage as his trainer? His desire to please you. Motivation is the key. Motivate him positively and consistently and he will become responsive and obedient.

Many people hesitate to obedience train their dogs because they associate "Discipline" with harsh, vindictive punishment. It is true that some dogs can be forced to carry out commands through fear of punishment. Generally speaking, however, when the means of enforcing that punishment, i.e., the leash, the rolled-up newspaper, the switch, disappears...so does the dog.

Proper discipline is the establishment of guidelines, boundaries which encompass a range of acceptable behavior patterns for your dog. Correction should always be appropriate to the mistake: a flip of the lead and an encouraging word when he lags behind; a sharp no-nonsense jerk if he lunges at the dog next to him. Save the crack across the muzzle for the really serious things: unwarranted fighting, chasing cars, or killing the neighbor's chickens. Harsh corrections in most cases, only confuse and panic the dog so that he is no longer capable of learning from the situation.

Remember, if the dog makes a mistake, nine times out of ten, it will be because you have not indicated to him properly and consistently what you want him to do. You may have to show him ten times, or a hundred times, before he understands. Correction is only a preliminary step in the training process. Real training begins when you show him what he should do; i.e., when you substitute a correct behavior pattern for the incorrect one.

The best trainers are habitually observant people, constantly aware of reaction and response between themselves and their dogs. For the most part, they are calm, unexcitable when confronted with unpredictable behavior, and confident - confident in their ability to control the dog and confident in the dog's potential to understand if correctly approached.

Unique breed character must be taken into consideration. Though playful enough as a puppy, the Bullmastiff often takes a rather serious, sober attitude toward training as he matures. he likes to work and will concentrate hard on a new exercise for a given interval. However, once he learns it, he will quickly become lackadaisical if the exercise is not applied in a variety of utilitarian ways. Be certain, when you train your Bullmastiff, that what you may interpret as stubbornness, is not really boredom.

Too often we hear, "My dog wins consistently high scores at obedience trials, but I couldn't really depend upon him to obey me outside the ring." This working relationship is not complete. If the owner is interested only in "drill type" obedience that will bring in high scores and trophies, perhaps he will be satisfied; but, he will have missed most of the potential of his dog as a working companion.

The only way to build a complete working relationship is to clearly define your training objectives; to study your dog and yourself in order to adapt your training program to your specific strengths and limitations; to gain the respect and understanding of your dog by following through in both the intentional and unintentional training to give him a <u>raison d'etre</u>. The entire focus of his life should be to go with you, be with you, and work with you. Reward him generously with your approval and praise and patience. If he fails to learn, it is not because he lacks intelligence; it is because you have failed to tach him.

The life of the properly trained dog is filled with purpose. He is confident and relaxed because he lives within a framework of consistent guidelines. He reacts positively in new situations because his owner has taken care to expose him to a variety of experience and to build his confidence through a series of positive responses. He receives more approval and praise than corrections, because good behavior patterns have been instilled before bad ones could form.

Once the working relationship has been established, it will never be forgotten. Though you and your dog may be separated for many years, he will remember and respond with his last conscious breath when he turns toward your hand and his eyes ask, "Was the job well done?".

Although some people would disagree, Mr. S. E. Moseley is considered by many to be the founder of the Bullmastiff as we know it today. Looking through some old dog books, I am amazed that we ever got around to producing dogs which resembled each other in type. The dogs at stud between 1911 and 1920 were of widely differing weights and heights, though most were alike in color, being mostly brindle. Stapleford Pedro was said to weigh 100 pounds and he was a winner in "night dog classes".

The following excerpt was written by Mr. S. E. Moseley, but I am unable to give you the date.

"I propose to define my ideal of a bull-mastiff and his claim as a utility dog, 'police, watch, personal guard and companion or night dog.' My object is to guide the novice against pitfalls in their beginning, which so often dishearten recruits to a new breed. After thirty years experience in breeding and training, I see no reaosn to depart widely from the type set by those grand old dogs of the past, "Thorneywood Terror," "Osmaston Viper" and "Shireland Vindictive".

The bull-mastiff should be fawn or brindle in colour (the former is at the moment most favored) while a little white is permissible, showing his inheritance of bulldog blood.

His weight should be 90 to 110 pounds; his height 27 to 28 inches (a bitch may be 10 pounds less in weight and 1 inch less in height than a dog). I would rather a 25 or 26 inch and quality, than those 30 inch and over dogs of the Great Dane type. A bull-mastiff should be active and free from cow-hock and splay-feet, a perfectly assimilated 60 percent mastiff 40 percent bulldog. Little, if any, care has been taken in breding some so-called bull-mastiffs. To produce a dog I had in mind, I set out with a well defined plan for my first pillar on the following foundation.

Taking a mastiff bitch and a bulldog, I produce 50-50. A bitch of these I mate to a mastiff dog, and this gave me a 75 percent mastiff 25 percent bull bitch, which I mate to a 50-50 dog, and a bitch from this litter 62 1/2 mastiff, 37 1/2 bull, I mate to a 50-50 dog, and a bitch from this litter I put to a 62 1/2 mastiff 37 1/2 bulldog, which gave me approximately my ideal 60 percent mastiff 50 percent bull. I repeated this from other bloodlines as an outcross, and thus I established my "Farcroft" strain, and the bull-mastiff as a standard breed of set type, which breed true - like produces like.

In general appearance massive, yet active, short back, skull large, muzzle broad and deep, lower jaw powerful, flews not too pendulous, mouth level, eyes dark, alert and firm with furrow betwee, stop moderate, nostrils broad and large, neck powerful, shoulders muscular, chest deep and broad, well ribbed up, loin well knit and hind-quarters denoting power but not cumbersome, tail straight, strong and rather short, ears V to tulip, with a dark shade mask.

I make no apology for giving the weight and measurements of my dog "Farcroft Fidelity" a beautiful proportioned, evenly balanced animal. His height at shoulder is 28 inches; his weight is 116 pounds; his chest girth is 40 inches and 13 1@ inches across; his neck and skull are 26 inches; muzzle 16 inches (editor's note: in circumference); forearm 11 inches, in hard "not fat" condition. He is straight and active as a terrier, and of him Mr. Robert Leighton said: "he has hindquarters that would not disgrace an alsatian" (Dog World Nov. 13, 1924). MR W. J. Nichols said: "He has a short back, deep body, perfect front, witha big skull, nice ears and very active. A dog one could admire (Our Dogs Aug. 21, 1925).

Type at present varies somewhat, and appears to follow a fashion in different districts. The mastiff has been used too much in the south to get size; in the north bull-dog blood predominates; while in the Nottingham and Derby districts, the Great Dane has been extensively used, and many of the dogs from these districts show this most undesirable cross."

Following upon Mr. W. E. Moseley's pioneer work the Kennel Club issued the following statement which was duly published in the Kennel Club Gazette, December 24th, 1923: - "With reference to bull-mastiffs, the Committee, at their meeting of the 2nd instant, decided that it is prepared to open a section among the "any Other Variety" registrations for bull-mastiffs if pure bred as such, and when sufficient be registered under this heading, the breed would be eligible for a place in the register of breeds. It is, of course, most important to observe the distinction between a bull-mastiff (pure bred) and a bull-mastiff (crossbred), the former being a dog with both parents and the preceding three generations all bull-mastiffs without the introduction of a mastiff or a bulldog. The term bull-mastiff (crossbred) implies the existence of a cross which has not yet been bred out, according to Regulation 12 of the Regulations for Registration.

All registrations were entered under "Any Other Breed or Variety of British, Colonial, or Foreign Dogs Not Classified." The Kennel Club Gazette for April 1925 had nine bull-mastiffs listed as bull-mastiffs and two listed as bull-mastiffs (cross breeds). In the nine bull-mastiff registrations were those of Tiger Torus and PRincess Poppy' the sire and dam of Ch. Tiger Torous.

The Kennel Club Gazette for October 1927 saw the breed included in the register of breeds headed Bull Mastiffs (pure Bred). There were 16 registrations. This must have been a red letter day for Mr. S. E. Moseley..

NOTES FOR A SEMINAR GIVEN BY MONA LINDAU-WEBB

This is what I expect from my dog:

- 1. My dog must be quiet and inconspicuous but he must bark and guard for visitors.
- 2. My dog must be kind to children but children are not always expected to be nice to the dog.
- 3. My dog must welcome all my friends, the gardeners, and the cleaning people and Santa Claus (through the chimney, moreover!) but must chase away IRS auditors, salesmen, and burglars.
- 4. My dog must be calm and not bug me but he must be lively, active, and playful.
- 5. My dog must be "up" and full of himself but yet be able to walk quietly on leash at snailpace.
- 6. My dog must understand what I say although there was not always time to teach him.
- 7. My dog must obey me immediately and unconditionally but, of course, he must keep his individuality and be an independent soul.

Adopting a puppy:

Before you decide to adopt a puppy, take some time in selecting your breed and finding a good puppy in your breed. Why do you want a dog? How much time, money, and effort are you willing to spend on a puppy?; on a dog in the next 10 years? What do you expect out of a dog? How would the dog fit into your lifestyle? What is your lifestyle?

More points to consider: Mixed or purebred? Breeder, shelter, pet shop? Male or female?

Socialization period - to dogs 4-6 weeks to people 4-12 weeks

Juvenile period 12 weeks to maturity

In the **neonatal** period the pup cannot see or hear or control his temperature, so the pup's behavior consists mainly of:

- 1. whining
- 2. rooting crawling around with the head and neck stretched forward and swinging from side to side, searching for food and warmth.

All social interaction is with the mother.

Subjecting the puppy to mild stress, like change of footing, small changes in temperature, handling by people, some discomfort is beneficial for the puppy's development.

In the **transitional** period the puppy's senses hook up with the world. Say "hi" to your puppies. The mother starts weaning them. They start social interaction with their littermates. An enriched environment with toys tires, tunnels, little puppy balance walks, and exposure to environmental sounds can really help develop the personality and brains of the puppy.

In the **socialization** period, more care-seeking behaviors towards the mother appear, e.g. yelping, licking the mother's lips, jumping up and pawing the mother. The mother's actions influence the puppy for life. A good mama-dog plays and sleeps with her puppies, and she corrects them when they do wrong. Swedish studies also show that puppies that were never subjected to punishment by their mother were much more difficult to train later. On the other hand, puppies that had overbearing mothers tended to become inhibited dogs.

Play with littermates

creates social bonds with other dogs, teaches communication skills, establishes the dominance relationships within the litter, teaches the "inhibited" bite, promotes physical coordination, teaches problem solving.

Puppies new home 7 - 16 weeks

- 1. Do lots of touch-conditioning by petting, brushing, and holding the puppy.
- 2. Do daily cartrips, starting with very short trips and gradually lengthen them.
- 3. Get puppy used to collar and leash, and start taking the puppy for walks in the neighbourhood.
- 4. Take the puppy to several different locations every week, and go for a short walk. Do NOT take the puppy to public parks, the beach or a dog show. Do take the puppy to busy streets, sit with the puppy in outdoor cafes. Take the puppy with you through a car wash. Take the puppy to stay with you in a motel for the weekend. Travel in the car to visit friends and relative with the puppy. Take the puppy to play on the equipment in playgrounds late at night or very early in the morning, and make sure you clean up after your puppy.
- 5. Make sure you take the puppy out at night occasionally.

NOTES (continued):

6. Expose the puppy to different sounds. Play loud tape recordings, give the puppy balloons to pop, stand outside when the trash truck comes, do a lot of vacuuming.

- 7. Give the puppy a bath every 3-4 weeks.
- 8. Do a lot of grooming. Be sure to cut the toenails every week.
- 9. Start puppy obedience. The puppy MUST learn to come when called.
- 10. Teach puppy lots of games to play with you: retrieve a ball, tug, hide-and-seek, follow the leader (you are the leader), find the hidden treats. Remember that the team that plays together, stays together.
- 11. Teach puppy to pay attention to you when you say a special sound.
- 12. Let the puppy play with other nice puppies of different breeds once or twice a week.
- 13. Make sure the puppy meets children, old people, people in uniforms, people in wheelchairs, a nice veterinarian, people on crutches, loudmouths, people of different ethnic backgrounds.
- 14. Remember that the house-training will be much easier with a crate-trained puppy.

Please do NOT stick the puppy in the back yard and wait for it to grow up into a nice dog.

RIGHT NOW RECIPES

GRUYERE CHEESE SALAD

1/2 lb. Swiss Gruyere cheese, shredded1/2 cup olive oil1 cup sliced green onions2 Tbsp. wine vinegar1 cup diced celery1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard

1 cup diced green pepper 1/2 tsp. salt

1 cup pimiento-stuffed green olives, sliced two grinds black pepper

4 cups shredded lettuce

Combine the cheese, onions, celery, green peppers and olives in a large bowl. Beat the oil, vinegarm mustard, salt and pepper in a small bowl.Pour the dressing over the cheese mixutre, toss to blend. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Serve over shredded lettuce. Serve with French bread.

FRUIT SALAD LOG

1 (30 oz.) can fruit cocktail 2 pkg. (8 oz each) cream cheese

1 1/2 cups minature marshmallows 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

2 cups whipped sweetened whipping cream lettuce

Drain fruit coctail, set aside. Blend will softened cream cheese and add whipping cream. Fold in walnuts and fruit cocktail. Spoon mixture into two 1 lb. coffee cans cover and freeze. To remove from cans, cut bottom lids off and push "logs" out onto serving plate. Garnish with lettuce. Slice to serve.
