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P R O B L E M S

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Skin problems are unfortunately very common in all breeds. The skin being truly the largest organ in the body, is in fact the easiest way for the body to eliminate toxins. We have been conditioned by the medical establishment that when we see any skin abnormality, it is to be viewed as troublesome and unsightly and must be gotten rid of it as fast as possible (i.e. the usual route of antibiotics and possible steroids).

When nothing but conventional treatment is used it leads to a suppression of symptoms. But what happened to the toxins the body was trying to eliminate? The problem may appear gone, and may stay that way for a short term. When the body feels up to " housecleaning" again, the symptoms may return. Again, if suppression methods are used for treatment, you are effectively pushing back the problem deeper into the body. Soon the body will give up trying to eliminate through the skin and will choose to go through the organs instead, leading to a much more serious illness..

Holistic methods will help the body to deal with the underlying problem so that a true healing response is obtained. There are a great variety of methods used and all are aimed at helping the body help itself. There are cases when a problem warrants antibiotic treatment. Sometimes you have to put the fire out before the clean up crew can go in and do the job. When this is combined with giving the body support holistically, good results can be achieved.

I will try to touch briefly here on a few of the more common skin problems and some good remedies to treat them. In cases of serious illness veterinarian advise should always be sought.

Demodectic Mange has become quite a problem which usually afflicts the younger dog. (However, chronic cases are becoming more frequent in the older animal.) The usual course of treatment after diagnosis is to use harsh chemical dips until all signs of the mites are gone. In severe unresponsive cases, Ivermectin is being tried on a daily basis. A problem with active mange is a compromised immune system which must be addressed. Dips only further hurt the immune system and in cases of very sick animals have actually caused death. We have been very successful in treating mange holistically. Topically Lavender oil is used alternately with lemon juice directly on the spots. Internally the immune system must be helped. A glandular nutritional supplement called Immuplex combined with BHI homeopathic remedies called Skin and Inflammation are used. NR Herbal Compounds are also excellent to help boost the immune system and should be used regularly for maintenance and prevention. This is a Juliette de Bairacli Levy formula that combines garlic, sage, thyme, eucalyptus, wormwood, rue and vegetable charcoal that has given excellent results over decades of usage. This is wonderful when given routinely to all dogs (and cats) as a preventative and for their overall good health. Vitamins are also important in the mange case. Supplementation of vitamins, E; C; B and zinc should be given. Diet is of course important and as much fresh food should be given as possible. If the mange surfaced after a period of vaccination, then detoxifying with the homeopathic remedies Thuja and Sulphur are good to help clear the body of the residual effects.

Dermatitis and staphylococcus infections are common problems. They can occur by themselves or as secondary infections. The same homeopathics and supplements as mentioned previously can be used,

in conjunction with BHI Lymphatic. This will help rally the lymph glands into helping boost the immune system to fight infection.

Chinese herbal complexes are excellent to use. Isatis 6 is a combination that will not only fight bacterial infections but also viral and fungal as well. Astragalus 10+ combination helps the immune system especially in chronic situations. This complex has also given good results in severely depressed immune systems. If the staph infection is persistent then a homeopathic nosode can be given to help the body build its own immunity to the bacteria. This has been quite effective. A homeopathic remedy called Cutis comp. (Heel) has a deeper action on the skin and also can give good results.

A great substitute for antibiotics is Colloidal Silver. This forgotten remedy (due to the high power pharmaceutical companies) has proven itself throughout history. There are almost no disease causing organisms that can live in the presence of even minute traces of chemical elemental silver. It has the ability to destroy not only bacteria, but viruses and fungi as well. However one has to be extremely careful as to the quality of the product. Many companies are promoting it as the panacea to all problems. Colloidal Silver should not be used prophylactically on a long term basis. Be very wary of companies marketing hype that tell you otherwise.

Unfortunately in the process of healing skin conditions it is common to suffer hair loss. Reducing the amount of hair loss and aiding in speeding up the regrowth process can certainly be helped with holistic remedies. Homeopathically, BHI Hair & Skin combined with BHI Enzyme greatly help the body in triggering the proper enzymatic function for hair growth. Fresh chopped Dandelion leaves can be added to the food and the affected areas can be bathed in an infusion of Rosemary or Marigold. Providing the proper trace elements and minerals is also very important. I have relied on NR Seaweed Mineral food for the last ten years. This is a blend of deep ocean Seaweed from Europe (made from the whole plant and not just the surface growth) combined with other key herbs such as Nettles, Cleavers and Uva Ursi. When used daily it promotes strong thick coat; good pigmentation; supports bones, reproductive organs and Thyroid function. Many breeders tell me the dramatic difference they see when using this product over the current kelp products that they had been using (many of which come from polluted N. America shores or are so highly heat processed they have lost the essential nutrients).

Fatty Acid supplements are also important to the overall health and in particular help the skin and coat when used daily. The supplement should be high in Omega 3 fatty acids and should be in the form of cold pressed oil. If high heat is used in the processing (i.e. capsules, or powder forms) it will kill all the benefits of the product. The only brands of oil that I trust to be correctly labeled are: Flora; Omega Nutrition; or Seymour Organics. I prefer Flax seed oil. Please do not think that by reading this ingredient on your dog food or supplement label, that this is enough. The body needs a truly cold processed product in order to utilize it.

A very common problem in any breed is ear infections. The usual fare of antibiotic or steroidal ointments are commonly used. This may clear the problem temporarily, but quite often the ears become chronically infected. Yeast infections usually being the predominant trouble. To help this I have had good success using the Herbal Earwash to cleanse the ear as needed. Externally Traumeel liquid (Heel) is put in the ear twice daily to help decrease the itching or inflammation. Internally a Chinese herbal complex called Picrorrhiza 11 is given. This herbal combination helps the body fight yeast infections while at the same time it helps boost the immune system. As the ears improve the Traumeel would be discontinued and

normal cleansing with the Herbal Earwash would be maintained. The Picrorrhiza 11 can be used long term if needed (i.e. in a genetic problem).

Many ear problems can also be related to allergies, either inhalant or food related. A wide variety of dermatological conditions may originate with allergies. Allergies are at epidemic proportions today both in animals and humans. The causes are many and the entire subject is certainly beyond the scope of this article. Each animal needs to be treated on an individual basis, to help determine the underlying cause of the sensitivity in the first place. However I can touch on a few suggestions to help get things on the right track.

Allergy symptoms can be troublesome and often show up as itchy skin. Homeopathically BHI Allergy and Skin remedies can bring on relief (instead of using anti-histamines). If the itching is severe then Chinese herbal complexes called Zaocys and Xanthium 12 are extremely helpful in reducing irritation. A bath in Murphy's oil soap (made from pure vegetable oils) or an epsom salt soak can be soothing during the healing. If the skin is "hot" to the touch or red and irritated then a supplement called Beta Thym would be used. This supplement contains Thymus, L-ornithine and Beta Sitosterol (a plant derivative of cortisol) which greatly helps to reduce the inflammation in the body naturally, while also helping to boost the immune system.

Often, in chronic allergies or when there has been a history of drug use, the body's adrenal function is stressed and thus compromised. By giving a glandular nutritional supplement called Adrenal Complex this helps the body pick up the nutrients it needs to heal. Any allergy is a sign of a weakened immune system which needs to be supported. This can be helped with the supplements mentioned for mange.

Additionally Pycnogenol is excellent in helping to reduce histamine production while increasing the bioavailability of vitamin C. Pycnogenol is made from Pine Bark and has been a long favored anti-oxidant in Europe. Again one must be very careful as to the source of supply as most companies have only 30 % bioavailability to the body. A good supplement should have 90% + bioavailability. (This is wonderful for us humans too!) I use Pycnogenol from Da Vinci Labs.

If you know what your dog is allergic to (which can be tested for), a desensitization program can be utilized. In place of using serum injections of the antigens, homeopathy can be used with excellent results. The antigens are made into homeopathic remedies called allersodes and are given to the patient orally. These help to create the correct immune response to achieve desensitization without any risks of side effects or overdosing which can occur with the injections (less costly too!) This has proven very successful in flea allergies. For flea desensitization we use a product called Biting Insect Mix.

Hot spots can occur from a variety of problems and can be treated in several different ways. I prefer using a homeopathic ointment called Traumeel externally on the spots. Often, when caught early this is enough to dry up the spot. Or this can be used in alternation with colloidal silver. Orally BHI Skin, Inflammation, and Traumeel work well to promote healing and stop the progression of any further outbreaks. These same formulas work well for interdigital cysts too. If these problems are reoccurring then again the immune system needs help. Generally, NR Herbal Compounds and / or Immuplex provide the needed support.

In cases of eczema or dandruff type conditions where the animal has been given the proper Omega 3

fatty acids and vitamin E but the trouble still persists, this can be indicative of liver congestion. The liver is the toxic eliminator for the body. Through aging; overuse of drugs; poor nutrition, etc. the liver becomes less efficient at waste removal. Nutrients that are needed by the blood supply to nourish the skin become "backed up" and can not be utilized. To help this a Chinese herbal combination called Tang Kuei 18 is given. This aids in nourishing the blood supply and alleviating congestion, while giving aid to the liver function. The skin then has a chance to heal.

In any skin condition it is common to find that the liver function is stressed. Most dogs today need liver support just simply due to environment; processed food; heartworm preventatives, etc. To give good ongoing support to the liver a glandular called Livaplex can be given routinely. This is extremely important and can give an amazing relief of symptoms when combined with Immuplex. Seniors, in particular, can benefit from this supplement. Milkthistle and Dandelion also aid in supporting the liver. A bloodwork analysis called a Metabolic Nutritional Analysis is extremely useful for all animals. This allows us to determine where the animal may be out of balance regarding endocrine function and then what specific nutritional support is needed to help the body regain a functional balance to heal itself. This can be done preventatively before physical symptoms are apparent and of course it is most important during illness. This has truly saved the lives of many "hopeless" and "untreatable" cases, that were given up on by conventional treatments. Used alone or in conjunction with conventional therapies results are outstanding.

As more and more prestigious Universities are adding courses in natural medicine to their curriculum, it would appear that access to a greater variety of health care is a growing demand. There is a great deal of new science behind holistic treatments that is being brought to the forefront daily. Modern technology is providing the tools to help us understand that there are effective methods of dealing with health problems other than poisoning, cutting or burning. We can all benefit as long as we continue to be open to learning.

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RIGHT NOW RECIPES

HOT CHICKEN SALAD

Serves 6

2 cups cooked chicken

cut in bite size pieces

1 to 2 cups finely chopped celery

½ cup toasted slivered almonds

½ tsp salt

2 Tbsp grated onion

2 Tbsp lemon juice

¾ cup mayonnaise

½ cup grated Cheddar cheese

1 to 2 cups crushed potato chips

In a large mixing bowl, combine chicken, celery, almonds, salt, onion, lemon juice and mayonnaise. Mix well. Transfer to a lightly greased 1 ½ quart baking dish. Top with cheese and potato chips. Bake in a preheated 425 degree oven for 10 minutes or until hot and bubbly.

This recipe can be served hot or cold. It can be prepared in advance and either refrigerated or frozen until needed. If the casserole is frozen it should be thawed before baking at 425 degrees or if cooked unthawed it should be baked at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly.

Is it the owners of my mom who just let this man come and take me away? I don't think they told him how to take care of me or what would happen to me while my Dad is at work and I'm in my pen out back. But here they come again; it's the little people. They hurt me with their sticks and stones twice a day and sometimes more. Maybe it's the little people's parents who let them teach me how to hate.



One day me and my dad were in the house and he would not get up. What is wrong? I go six days without food or water. Finally some other big people come and I guard my dad because I love him. But I am so hungry and thirsty. They put food and water outside so I would go to it. When I turn around they have taken my dad away. I guess they forgot about me.

I wait for my dad. He loves me, I know. I stay on the step of the house until I must go look for food. Only now the big people scream, kick and hurt me with their sticks and stones. I wonder what I did that was so wrong.

Eight days or so and a man give me food in the back of his truck. He is taking me somewhere, maybe to my dad. I miss him so much. The man takes me to a big person's house. A mom like the one my mom had feeds and waters me. I get to eat as much as I want. But I want my dad, I guess he doesn't love me. I don't know if I can trust any people, big or little.

I stay outside but I have a house. Just when I start getting used to my new mom, she does me just like my mom's mom did to me. She takes me to a place that smells like medicine. There are strange people all around me in blue coats and my new mom is gone. What did I do that was so wrong?

These new people poke and prod. No! That hurts and I must fight back before they throw their sticks and stones. The next day they put me into another truck and take me away. I go to a new place. There are new people. Maybe my dad is here. I miss him so much. They seem nice but I don't trust them, for soon they'll poke and prod or throw their sticks and stones.

Maybe this will be okay. There are others here just like me. The man seems to love them just like my dad loves me. I wonder why my dad doesn't come and get me. Just when I thought this new place was going to be safe, a little person comes down the steps. Yes, I must get her before she gets me with her sticks and stone.

The next day the man puts me in another truck. What have I done that is so wrong? We go to the place where the blue coats are. Well at least the new man is staying with me. Maybe he is okay. I don't understand why he is crying and so upset. I've tried to be what they taught me to be.

They stick me with a needle. But wait...is that my dad coming for me?

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Editor's Note: Well, if there is a dry eye in the house after reading that I'd be shocked. What a wonderful, compassionate person Ed must be to have so well understood **BRANSON** and told his story with such feeling. **BRANSON** is just one of many Bullmastiffs (and other dogs for that matter) who have suffered at the hands of ignorant, cruel, uncaring people.

The people involved in Bullmastiff Rescue can tell you lots of other horror stories about wonderful animals who's minds and bodies have been twisted by people who didn't deserve to get near a Bullmastiff let alone own one.

Bullmastiff Rescue workers have the joy of finding the right home for a dog that is long overdue for one, or the heartbreak of giving what comfort they can and then having to destroy a dog because it cannot be cured or cannot cope mentally because of what it has endured.

Can you help? You certainly can! If you are a breeder be extra extra careful who gets your pups. Be sure to have a written agreement that if for any reason the new owner can't keep the dog, you have first rights to it. CANINE PROSTATE
ULTRASONIC SURGERY Z/ PS ABSCESSSES

A University of Georgia College of Veterinary Medicine team of scientists, led by Dr. Clarence Rawlings, has been studying a new surgical technique, ultrasonic surgical aspiration, to remove prostatic cysts and abscesses in dogs. This 2-year Morris Animal Foundation-funded study recently completed with impressive results.

Problem: Enlarged prostate glands from cysts or abscesses are common in geriatric dogs, especially those that have not been neutered. This is a frustrating condition for owners to manage because of the symptoms their dogs will most likely encounter. Frequently, these dogs will develop life-threatening sepsis (toxic shock), have persistent urinary tract infections, are constipated, and have difficulty urinating. Managing prostatic disease with antibiotics has been generally unsuccessful because of the difficulty in delivering antibiotic to the prostatic tissue. Conventional surgical treatments are accompanied by side effects. Surgical drainage of the cyst is frequently followed by return of prostate disease, or development of persistent infection. Although prostatectomy prevents recurrence of infection and disease, most dogs become incontinent.

Accomplishment: This study determined whether or not prostatic disease persists, the degree of continence, and the presence of urinary tract infection one year after partial prostatectomy to treat large prostatic abscesses and cysts. Dr. Rawling's team evaluated the benefits of a revolutionary procedure called ultrasonic surgical aspiration for this condition. This technique is less invasive than conventional surgery and involves inserting a small tube through which the device sends ultrasonic waves into the abscess. The cyst/abscess is weakened and removed, by suction, from the prostate gland. This technique leaves the urethra with its nerves and vessels intact.

Twenty pet dogs brought to the Teaching Hospital for prostatic disease treatment participated in this study with the owner's consent/ Follow up surveys were conducted at three months, six months, and one year after the ultrasound surgery for prostatic disease.

Dr. Rawlings is pleased with the findings, "We found that dogs with severe prostatic abscesses or cysts and infections can be successfully treated by partial prostatectomy and castration, resulting in long term disease resolution." Nearly all the dogs in the study resumed normal urinary control, Dr. Rawlings continues, "These postoperative results appear to be better than with any previous technique for prostatic disease." Further, he recommends that unless a male dog is to be used for breeding, it should be castrated in a effort to reduce the likelihood of prostatic disease.

This study was conducted by Drs. Clarence A. Rawlings, Mary B. Mahaffey, Jeanne A. Barsanti, Jane E. Quandt, John E. Oliver, JR., Wayne A. Crowell, Myron O. Downs, Anita R. Stampley and Sheila W. Allen.

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**AVOID GIVING PETS
HUMAN PAIN RELIEVERS**

SCIENCE AND THE DOG

Pet owners are frequently tempted to relieve their pets’ aches and pains with human painkiller drugs. This can be very dangerous because animals react differently than people do to drugs such as acetaminophen, ibuprofen and the newest over-the-counter painkiller naproxen sodium.

“The newer and stronger painkillers for people, like ibuprophen or naproxen sodium, can cause stomach and internal bleeding and possibly death in dogs,” explains Dr. Kenneth Drobotz, head of the Emergency Service at the Veterinary Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. “All of these drugs can have equally serious side effects in cats, for whol Tylenol® {a form of acetaminophen} is fatal.”

When considering giving any medication to a pet, owners should talk to their veterinarian first. The phone call could save the animal’s life. (University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine)

THE ASSUMPTION THAT KILLS DOGS

About sixteen years ago, I had the opportunity to engage in some volunteer work at a local Animal Humane Shelter. (Since that time, I've done volunteer work at two other shelters in two other states and found essentially the same situation.) Something happened to me during this experience which I have never forgot. Looking back now, it seems an inordinately long period of time was required for me to learn what would be helpful to correct a really impossible situation concerning dogs.

I was perfectly content to clean the cages and feed and water the dogs being held at the shelter. But, one day, I was asked to help kill the dogs who had met the deadline. Of course, they did not use the words deadline or kill. They, like most of us, use more polite words than kill. I prefer to say what is really happening. Maybe this is a small step in helping people to truly realize the reality of the fate of many dogs.

My job, as I learned, was to bring the selected dogs into a particular room. In this room, there was a young fellow with a hypodermic syringe whose duty it was to inject the dogs, thus killing them. I brought about twenty five dogs into the room that morning. When we were finished, I looked around the room. The floor was littered with bodies. There was a pure bred Collie, a pure bred Irish Setter, a couple of Dobermans, a few other pure breeds and the rest of dogs were cross breeds. They were all lying about the room as if asleep. But they were not asleep. They were dead! I could not stop myself. I cried.

A few minutes earlier, all these dogs had been vibrant and full of life. Now they were lifeless, dead. The waste of these dog's lives simply overwhelmed me. I asked the young fellow with the needle, "How can you do this week after week?". I could read the sadness in his face as he replied, "What is the alternative?". At the time, I did not have an answer for him. What follows, I believe, is at least a part of the answer which I would have given to him, had he asked me that same question today.

Do you know why eighty percent of the dogs arrive at a dog pound, or SPCA [Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals] or various other shelters? In the past, figures like forty to seventy percent were heard, but the latest

figure is eighty percent! These dogs arrive at these places because they were behavioral problems for their owners!

Imagine that! Eighty percent of these dogs are there because their owners did not know how to deal with their dog's behavior. The vast majority of these dogs are killed! They are not put to sleep, or any of the other polite names we may use. They are killed! I find this truly repugnant and astounding because this appalling situation is so easily preventable.

The assumption that kills dogs is that we believe everyone automatically knows how to teach a dog to behave appropriately is what really kills these dogs. Most of us think nothing of giving or selling a dog to nearly anyone who comes along. We pat ourselves on the back because we made a buck or found a "good" home for the dog. The dog now, or in the future, becomes someone else's problem. If I sound a little angry, it's because I am! I am angry with myself as well as with others because I believed, for years, as others believe, that nearly anyone can teach a dog to behave properly.

After twenty years of training dogs, I have learned how little most people understand of a dog's behavior and how to change it if it becomes necessary. Loving a dog or dogs does not equal the ability to train a dog properly. I'm sure you have noticed when you purchase a coffee pot, a VCR, A.T.V., a weed

eater, a computer, a toaster, or nearly anything you may purchase, there is a set of instructions on how to maintain and use the item. An instruction manual will usually come with the item. In fact, we become quite upset if the instructions are missing. Even a box of pancake mix or cereal has a set of directions. I'm quite sure, even by trial and error, I, and most other people could figure out how to cook a pancake or fix a bowl of cereal without the directions, maybe.

Compare the above with either buying, adopting or having a dog given to you. Notice, most often there are no instructions or directions. We assume everyone already knows how to teach a dog to behave properly. However, many of these dogs pay the price of mistreatment, abuse and finally with their lives for this assumption.

This animal called a dog is a million times more complex than any VCR, T.V., or computer and comes with no instructions! Often we respond to a dog as though he or she were a plant. All that is necessary is to feed and water it once or twice a day. The rest of what may be required is somehow supposed to take care of itself.

Hundreds, perhaps thousands, of people all across this country have worked tirelessly to promote the spaying and neutering of dogs. I believe it has helped in terms of being beneficial in preventing many unwanted pups. With equal dedication, we can promote ways and means of teaching people how to teach their dogs to behave in ways which will make them an enjoyable addition to the dog owner's life. This approach could make changes we perhaps can not imagine at this time. Armed with information on how to teach a dog how to behave appropriately, and to be able to do this quickly and effectively, could make a radical difference in the statistics quoted above.

Certainly, we are all aware that there are libraries available to us for dog training books. Most pet shops offer books on dog training. Understanding human nature, we can well imagine the dozen or so excuses one could create about not having the time to get to the library, or someone not wanting to spend the money, or the time hunting, for a book on how to train dogs. In addition, most people really believe, if they think about it at all, that they already know how to train a dog properly. It is not until sometime later when problems arise, these same people may become aware of the need for some help. It is also highly likely the problems which do arise could easily have been avoided with some early obedience training.

Notice once again that the manufacturer of the all the afore mentioned products does not expect the buyer to chase around to find a set of instructions, or directions, on how to operate their product. They make it easy for the buyer to use their product more efficiently and easily. The manufacturer does not leave it to chance. They want to make sure the buyer will enjoy the product they purchased.

I would like to see an abbreviated version of The Gentle Method, or its equivalent, made available. In fact, all it would take is a short pamphlet with the "meat" of the subject in every dog shelter, dog pound and petshop and with every dog breeder in the country. It would be a huge undertaking. The benefits to dogs everywhere, and to their human owners, would be enormous!

Presently, for the most part, when one buys or adopts a dog, the dog must have his or her shots, perhaps spayed or neutered and often a license. In fact, there are a few dog shelters which now employ dog trainers to train the dogs before adoption. This is a start, but there never will be enough trainers to really take care of the need, particularly with the old, slow, traditional training methods. Why not give
